Recap: Annual General Meeting June 22, 2024 Special guest speaker: Robert (Bob) Oaks

It was a bright, sunny morning at the comfortable Waioli Kitchen & Bakery (formerly Waioli Tea Room) party room in Manoa when 26 Caledonians gathered on June 22 to begin our Annual General Meeting with generous-sized scones and coffee. In our honor, our host, Russell, wore a sport kilt which he said he had worn in the past for hiking on the John Muir trail in California. Lunch, after the AGM meeting and our speaker's talk, was tasty and abundant including sandwiches, salad, and a generous haupia bread pudding.

Among the attendees were our newest member, RSCDS Scottish dance teacher, Michael McIntosh, who served as our tech helper for the day, Katherine Love who was introduced to the Society by member Tory Laitila, and also our longest-term current founding member, Scott MacKinnon, who is now retired.
