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Scottish Heroes XIII The beginning of our 2024-2025 season

The Caledonian Society Council has set the events for the 2024-2025 season. The first one is scheduled for September 14th as a Zoom **Scottish Heroes** event. Our Heroes series began in 2020 with the Covid prohibition of gatherings. We have learned about Scottish people from the past who have accomplished much in areas of industry, exploration, science, and just true grit. Over the years we have worked hard to get the Zoom experience one that we can be proud of and now we are planning for Scottish Heroes XIII.

Our Heroes meetings began in earnest on May 30, 2020, with Hardy Spoehr discussing "The Wizard Meets the King: John Anderson meets King Kamehameha IV." Then three more Zoom meetings in 2020 where we heard about Sue Black, a contemporary forensic anthropologist who innovates ways to identify victims of crimes, wars, and natural disasters; Eric Liddell, the 1924 Christian Olympic runner who was portrayed in the movie *Chariots of Fire*; botanist & explorer David Douglas; composer & fiddler Neil Gow; novelist Josephine Tey, and many more before the year ended. Because this was a way to keep in touch with the members and provide some much-needed socialization, the Zoom format has become a staple of almost all of our events. Even the tribute to Robert Burns was done virtually for two years with haggis/whisky bags hand delivered and all the poetry and speeches made via Zoom.



The Council has set September 14th as Heroes XIII, a Zoom meeting. The volunteers are: Chieftain McEwan presenting the "First Ministers of the Scottish Government"; Josh Beem will tell us about Elizabeth McHutcheson Sinclair, who purchased the Hawaii island of Ni'ihau in 1864; and Kevin Bogan will present "Robert the Bruce, Outlaw & King of Scotland." The First Publication of Encyclopedia Britannica: 1771

The first edition of the oldest and largest English language encyclopedia was issued in Edinburgh by the "Society of Gentlemen in Scotland" in instalments or numbers between 1768 and 1771. The printer and first editor was William Smellie and the major themes of the first edition were the arts and sciences. Later editions added history and biography. Various publishing houses took over responsibility for the encyclopedia and from 1929 it has had a transatlantic ownership. From that date it has been continuously revised rather than appearing in different editions. It remains a major work of scholarship and reference.

The word "encyclopedia" means "instruction in the whole circle of learning." Diderot and D'Alembert in France had issued L'Encyclopedie between 1751 and 1776. This publication was seen as a symbol of rational thought and attracted contributors of the highest intellectual ability. It was unsurprising that Scotland imitated France and produced the first English-language encyclopedia. Edinburgh was at the height of its fame as the centre of the Scottish Enlightenment, the "Athens of the North," and Scottish scholars and philosophers of the day consciously looked to France for their intellectual and cultural models. Scotland continued to have a great tradition in the production of encyclopedias. In 1859, Robert Chambers of W & R Chambers in Edinburgh issued Chambers' Encyclopedia.
